# Meet the Leukemia Team at Illinois CancerCare!

Acute Leukemia is a disease of the blood – it has several forms based on the type of white blood cell involved. It is classified as either myeloid or lymphoid in origin. It is a disease of the immature white blood cells which cease maturing into the adult blood cells and cause an overproduction of these immature blood cells. These cells, due to their overproduction, accumulate in the marrow thus preventing growth of normal white blood cells as well as red blood cells and platelets. Symptoms include anemia, bleeding, fatigue, weakness, and an increased risk of

infection. Treatment needs to be initiated rapidly, in most cases, to decrease the symptoms and prevent further bone marrow malfunction.

Treatment includes induction chemotherapy which is very intensive and involves clearing the marrow of the leukemic cells. Treatment can have many side effects including very low blood counts requiring blood and platelet transfusions and a high risk for infection. The induction chemotherapy is usually done in the hospital over a week or more. After induction treatment, consolidation and maintenance regimens are then done. Based on the type of leukemia, treatment can last a year or more. Many of these patients may even go on to a bone marrow or stem cell transplant.

Due to the intensity of the treatment, close monitoring of these patients is essential. After each treatment related hospitalization, patients are seen frequently and blood tests are monitored several times a week. Blood product support and symptom management is important and requires nursing coordination. If the patient is appropriate to proceed to transplant, then coordination of stem cell harvest and admission to a transplant hospital for further chemotherapy and radiation as well as the transplant is essential. Coordination is then needed between Illinois CancerCare and the transplant institution since the patient is then followed in both facilities. Communication between the transplant staff and our leukemia team is essential.

The physicians leading this team include Dr. Greg Gerstner, who is certified in internal medicine as well as hematology – oncology. He joined the

practice in 2007. His father is one of the founding members of Illinois Cancer Care, Dr. James Gerstner. Dr. Jane Liu is also a physician with the team and certified in internal medicine as well as hematology – oncology. She joined Illinois Cancer Care in 2012. They supervise the diagnosis, care, and treatment of the patients with acute leukemia in the practice as well as the autologous stem cell transplant patients at UnityPoint Health Methodist in Peoria.

Nurses on the team include Tiffany Crady RN, OCN and Holly Jo Delinski

RN, BSN, OCN. Holly has been with the practice 10 years and Tiffany has been here 7 years. Their role is to follow the patient from start to finish of their diagnosis and treatment. They transcribe the induction chemotherapy orders from the doctors, secure bone marrow results as part of diagnostics and disease monitoring, and monitor the frequent laboratory studies and order blood products as needed for support through treatment and recovery. These nurses also work with the various insurance companies to pre-certify admissions and secure approval for medications and supportive drugs.

Tiffany and Holly work with a new HLA (human leukocyte antigen) typing program with the University of Chicago's Bone Marrow Transplant program. The kit is sent to the nurses to be used for our patients going through induction therapy and they see that the blood is drawn and sent to the university if the patient is transplant eligible. The blood typing is then run through the National Bone Marrow Registry for free. This expedites the HLA typing process used to match donors by several weeks. This was not usually done until the patient's first visit to the transplant center which is usually 6 to 8 weeks after diagnosis.

The team usually meets once a week on Wednesday to go over all of the leukemia patients and where they are with treatment, transplant or follow up. This is a complex disease but the team helps the patient and their families navigate the unfamiliar road with caring and compassion. It is very comforting for the patients to have such a knowledgeable team and consistent members they become very familiar with to help them through this very frightening time.

## What is Nuclear Medicine?

Nuclear medicine uses very small amounts of radioactive materials (radiopharmaceuticals) to diagnose and treat disease. In imaging, the radiopharmaceuticals are detected by special types of cameras that work with computers to provide very precise pictures about the area of the body being imaged. In treatment, the radiopharmaceuticals go directly to the organ being treated. The amount of radiation in a typical nuclear imaging procedure is comparable with that received during a diagnostic x-ray, and the amount received in a typical treatment procedure is kept within safe limits.

Nuclear medicine imaging is unique, because it provides doctors with information about both structure and function.

#### What is a PET/CT?

Positron emission tomography, also called PET imaging or a PET scan, is a type of nuclear medicine imaging. A PET scan measures important body functions, such as blood flow, oxygen use, and sugar (glucose) metabolism, to help doctors evaluate how well organs and tissues are functioning.

CT stands for Computerized Tomography. During a CT scan, x-rays pass through specific areas of your body at different angles and a computer translates them into images. CT scanning provides clearer and more detailed information than x-rays used alone. The CT images can help your doctor diagnose many conditions.

The combined PET/CT scans provide images that pinpoint the anatomic location of ab within the body.

# Recipe from Sharon

### Mini Sweet Potato Casseroles with Walnuts

This recipe helps relieve constipation Preparation Time: 22 minutes

Makes 2 servings

### **Ingredients:**

1 ½ lb sweet potatoes, peeled and cut into ½ cubes

½ cups orange juice

3 ½ tablespoons butter, melted

2 tablespoons egg whites

½ teaspoon pumpkin pie spice

1/8 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon black pepper

2 tablespoons finely chopped walnuts

1 teaspoon vanilla

#### **Directions:**

1. Preheat oven to 400 degrees

2. Place sweet potatoes in medium pot and fill with enough cool water to cover potatoes. Bring to a boil. Cover and cook until very tender, about 10 minutes. Drain potatoes and place in a medium mixing bowl. Add orange juice, butter, vanilla, egg whites and pumpkin pie spice. With electric hand mixer, beat mixture until smooth. Add salt and pepper.

3. Divide mixture among 6- 4 ounce ramekins and sprinkle 1 teaspoon of the walnuts over top of each. Bake 10 to 12 minutes or until walnuts are lightly toasted and tops of potatoes are lightly browned.


