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Letter from the Executive Director

Fall is officially here - my favorite time of year! I always look forward to nature's beautiful hues of red, orange, and yellow combined with sweatshirts, bon fires, s'mores, caramel apples, pumpkin pie and football – Go Colts!

When seasons change, I find myself reflecting on the past while preparing for the new. This past summer the Foundation celebrated several wonderful fundraising events.

First, the 5th annual **Swing for the Cure** took place on May 29th at Peoria Chiefs Dozer Park. Illinois CancerCare provided tickets to 650 patients and their families along with 100 Illinois CancerCare staff members and their families. We are excited to announce \$4,500 was raised for the Foundation from onsite fundraising activities.

On July 11th the *4th Annual Leather and Leis River Run and Party*, sponsored by the Central Illinois Parrot Head Club kicked off at 10am at Kuchie's on the Water for a day of fun touring scenic riverfront stops while raising \$3,500.

Two weeks later the *Morton BBQ Throwdown event* took place on July 24th and 25th. This year marked the 5th year for this Kansas City BBQ sanctioned competition bringing together 45 professional teams from across the country raising \$23,500 dollars making a cumulative total of \$80,000.

The Illinois CancerCare Foundation's **4th Annual Golfin' In the Wild** event coordinated by the Foundation's Young Leaders Board took place on August 15th at Wildlife Prairie Park. Golfin' in the Wild is a unique, nine-hole golf course designed for any skill level. This event is crazy fun, packed with on-course activities, food and refreshments followed by a dinner and silent auction. This year was Wildly successful raising over \$31,000.

Saturday, August 22nd was the **4th Annual Eric Albers Memorial Event**. This fundraising event is held so that those who knew Eric may never forget him. Eric was diagnosed with Ewings Sarcoma (bone cancer) in May 2009, three days after he married his best friend and bride Liz Oyer. Liz, family and friends celebrated a big milestone this year by raising \$8,500 bringing their total dollars raised to \$25,000!

We ended this summer with a **CUREtini – Martini Tasting party** at **UFS Downtown Outlet Center** where this year's CUREtini was selected by our attendees while raising over \$1,100 in just 2 hours.

As you can see we had quite a bit of summer fun! *\$72,000* was raised for local research, education and patient care programming for cancer patients and their families. On behalf of the Foundation and the Board of Directors I want to Thank our volunteer leaders and communities for your generosity and support!

We aren't done yet...This fall we look forward to 2 more events— the *3rd Annual Theresa Tracy Trot*, a 4 mile run/2mile walk to be held on Saturday, November 7th at Bass Pro Shop in East Peoria. I invite you to come join me by signing up today at www. theresatracytrot.com.

We end the year with our final Foundation sponsored event, *CUREageous*. I would

Yields 10-12 bite-sized servings.

Recipe from Sharon Squash Crostini

Enjoy this fall-themed appetizer at Thanksgiving or your next holiday party. They are higher in calories and protein, and are great to nibble on when experiencing appetite loss or diarrhea.

Ingredients:

- 1 small butternut squash, halved lengthwise and seeded
- ½ Tbsp. olive oil + extra from brushing
- 1-1/2 cups chopped green onions
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- ½ tsp. pepper
- 1 baguette
- 3 Tbsp. peanut butter (or almond butter)

Directions

- 1 Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2 Place squash on a greased baking sheet, with the insides faced down, and place in the oven. Bake for 45 minutes or until tender.
- 3 Remove squash from oven and allow to cool.
- 4 Slice the baguette into bite-sized slices and brush with desired amount of olive oil while the squash is cooling. Arrange slices individually on a baking sheet.
- 5 Place baguette slices in the oven to toast for 8-10 minutes. Flip the slices halfway through.
- 6 Meanwhile, heat the ½ Tbsp. of olive oil in a skillet over medium-high heat. Add the green onions, salt, pepper, and cook until golden (about 5 minutes).
- 7 Remove the 1-½ cups of squash flesh, onions, and peanut butter to food processor. Purée until smooth, about 5 minutes. Spread over toasted crostini.

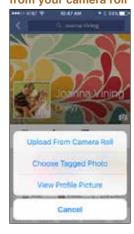

Do you need help getting to your doctor appointments? Road to Recover Program

The American Cancer Society Road To Recovery program is a curbside-to-curbside transportation service that provides free rides to cancer patients to and from their cancer-related treatments. Trained volunteer drivers donate their time and the use of their personal vehicles to help patients get to the treatments they need.

The program is offered to people with cancer who have no means of transportation and/or who are unable to drive themselves. Access to transportation is a major factor in cancer treatment, and this American Cancer Society service offers assistance to people who otherwise might not be able to follow their treatment plan as prescribed by their health care team.

Do you need help with hotel costs when traveling for treatment? Hotel Partners Program

The American Cancer Society partners with local hotels across the country to provide rooms for cancer patients who are not able to travel back and forth from home to the hospital while receiving treatment. Some cancer patients may not have someone to stay with in the area, and/or it is a financial hardship for them to pay for a hotel stay. Having a place to stay near the cancer treatment facility could be the difference between someone getting treatment or not.

Here at Illinois CancerCare, **Catherine Guebert**, **LCSW**, **OSW-c** is an onsite American Cancer Society Patient Navigator. 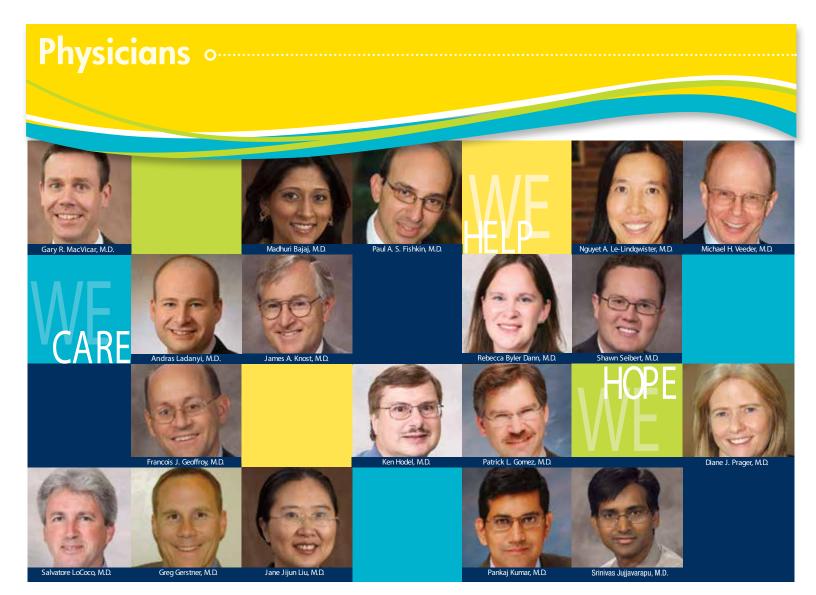
